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

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
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
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Kulas and Nissi Add Power to Trinity Gridders on Both Offense and Defense

Ed Kulas, a husky 193 lb. junior from Glastonbury, Conn., has displayed remarkable athletic prowess at Trinity, especially in football. Since his high school lacked an organized posing runners. team he was at a great disadvantage when he decided to play Freshman football among experienced team-
